Wildlife Road Traffic Accidents

GWC Volunteers often get the opportunity to accompany or assist local researchers; this month they spent a morning with Wendy Collinson, a local Msc student, studying wildlife road traffic accidents (WRTAs). It may be the less glamorous side to conservation and research but a vital study in determining the effect of WRTAs on South Africa's wildlife.

"Wildlife roadkill indicate a threat to biodiversity that can have long term effects on ecosystems. In the United States one million animals are killed each year on highways and these statistics do not account for animals that crawl off the road to die after being hit nor do they account for all species.

There is, at present, no standardised method for data collection of animals killed on South African roads and so we cannot quantify the threat of roadkill accidents to South African wildlife.

This project will conduct a critical assessment of wildlife road traffic accidents (WRTAs) in the Greater Mapungubwe Transfrontier Conservation Area, monitoring measures to develop an effective standardised toolkit that can be employed to better understand the factors contributing to WRTAs and consequently to assess threats to biodiversity from WRTAs across the country."
